### Steps to Complete Assignment:

- 1. **Research** the list of topics and choose one (can also choose one from paper packet)
- 2. Email your teacher with your topic choice. What did you choose and why?
- 3. **Paragraph 1 Intro** (~50 words) Define pandemic. What makes them so dangerous? Explain the overall concept of your disease and why it is considered a pandemic.
- 4. **Thesis-** The thesis is the last sentence of your introductory paragraph. It tells what your main points of your essay are.
- 5. **Paragraph 2**. (100-200 words) Describe your disease. Time period, location, how it began, how it is transmitted, and symptoms.
- 6. **Paragraph 3**. (100-200 words) Effects your disease had on the population. Death tolls, vaccines, testing, economy, lifestyle changes, etc.
- 7. **Paragraph 4.** (100-200 words) What are your thoughts on the current coronavirus pandemic? This is a place for you to share your opinions and make connections to the real world and what you're experiencing. Schools closing, restaurants, sporting events, concerns about the spread, etc.
- 8. **Paragraph 5 Conclusion:** (100-200 words) Why do pandemics occur? How can we work to prevent them? What is the lesson to be learned from experiencing one? Anything else you would like to add?
- 9. **Proofread** for spelling and grammar. If you can, send through Grammarly.com. Have a family member look over your work and provide feedback.
- 10. Read over your completed essay one last time. Submit via email or turn in to the front office.
